NORTH DAKOTA RESIDENTS SUPPORT REDUCING WASTEFUL GAS LEAKS OPPOSE WEAKENING OF FEDERAL REGULATIONS

By strong majorities, adult residents of North Dakota support state and federal laws designed to minimize wasteful natural gas leaks caused by industry practices (66%), federal regulations on public and tribal lands that do the same (76%) and require energy companies to invest in technology to make that happen (79%).

Support for these measures is strong across the political spectrum. Tough state and federal laws are supported by 72% of those who identify as Democrats, 60% who describe themselves as Republicans and 59% who say they are Independent.

Current federal regulations on public and tribal lands are backed by 87% of Democrats, 66% of Republicans and 77% of Independents. Requiring energy companies to invest in technology to meet these regulations has the support of 94% of Democrats, 71% of Republicans and 77% of Independents.

Conversely, most state residents oppose efforts in Congress to weaken regulations and lower industry requirements to reduce natural gas leaks (59%). On party lines, a majority of Democrats (80%-11%) and Independents (58%-21%) oppose softening regulations, as do a plurality of Republicans (44%-34%).

North Dakotans approve of the strong state level efforts to reduce flaring and want those tougher state standards applied at the federal level (70%) and on tribal lands (69%). That support also cuts across political party identifications lines. In fact, Republicans actually are the strongest supporters of applying North Dakota standards to tribal lands (74%).

Politically, these issues have a distinctly one-way advantage. Voting to weaken regulations designed to reduce wasteful gas leaks and punish companies that do not invest in technology to help reduce those leaks has no up-side.

By an average of about 4-to-1, state residents say they are “less likely” rather than “more likely” to vote for Heidi Heitkamp in the next election if she votes to favor the energy industry interests over those of taxpayers (35%-10%) or to give a competitive advantage to energy companies that don’t invest in technology to reduce gas leaks (38%-7%).

HOW THE POLL WAS CONDUCTED

This poll was conducted by Mason-Dixon Polling & Research, Inc. of Jacksonville, Florida from January 27 through January 30, 2017. A total of 625 North Dakota adult residents were interviewed statewide by telephone.

Those interviewed were randomly selected from a phone-matched list that included both land-line and cell phone numbers. Quotas were assigned to reflect population by county.

The margin for error, according to standards customarily used by statisticians, is no more than ± 4 percentage points. This means that there is a 95 percent probability that the "true" figure would fall within that range if all adult residents were surveyed. The margin for error is higher for any subgroup, such as a gender or age grouping.
